

THE JENNY BARRETT DEAF CHILD ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS 2024

Every year, at our AGM, we present the Jenny Barrett Deaf Child Achievement Awards. The awards set out to reward achievements of children with a hearing loss and they are split into two categories, the junior category which is for eleven years and under and the senior category which is for twelve years and above. In 2024 there were a total of nineteen children nominated.

The winners were announced at our AGM held on Saturday 12th October 2024 at Bournemouth Deaf Club. The awards were presented by Robin Barrett and the two overall age group winners received shields, certificates and cheques for £100 each. **YAZZ HANSFORD** was the winner in the senior category and the winner in the junior category was **FELIX BOWYER** All other nominees received £20 vouchers and certificates.

SENIOR NOMINEES

BRADLEY FARMER was nominated by Dawn Wrench, HSS Advisory Teacher, for his development, improved self-confidence and attainment over the last three years. His transition to secondary school is commended and this is shown in his hard work and positive interaction with teachers. He is also commended for his improved self-worth and focus and application to his learning. He is an excellent role model welcoming and supporting a new student with a hearing loss who joined the school.

YAZZ HANSFORD was nominated by her mother, Julie Hansford. She struggled at school in the 2 years leading up to GCSE's but she managed to pass her exams to secure a place in sixth form. She was selected to be a Senior Prefect. She is an active member of the BCP Youth Forum and helped manage the Youth Fund Project. She is also a Young Consultant for Participation People who inform and challenge adult audiences from all over the world to engage in youth participation. This involved facilitating workshops and keynotes in London, Southampton and Dublin advising how companies can include youth voice as an essential part of their business. Another post she holds is that of Youth Ambassador for The Center of Youth Voice project at George Williams College in London which involves gaining data to identify the strengths and gaps in youth voice and participation enabling support for young people. She is also a volunteer for DDCS and is a proven advocate for the society and school for both deaf children and those with additional needs. She attained a bronze Duke of Edinburgh award, leant to ski, paddle board and secured a part time job.

FRANCIS HAYWARD-NEVITT was nominated by Dawn Wrench, HSS Advisory Teacher. She is an outstanding role model explaining to peers and school staff why her hearing aids and radio aid is fundamental for her to access conversations. She and another student delivered a bespoke INSET to school staff and was articulate explaining about her equipment. She has enthusiasm and warmth and offers friendship to younger HSS students. She is an inspiring example of all that can be achieved with enthusiasm for life and a hard working ethic. She is thoughtful and caring and thinks of others.

HARRY LAKE was nominated by his mother, Judy Morris, his Aunt Tina Morris and Sarah Joiner, HSS Advisory Teacher, for his amazing progress in his GCSE's over the last two years. He found many subjects difficult and tried his hardest to achieve his full potential. He has excelled many teachers' expectations and has achieved fantastic GCSE results. He has struggled with many challenges which he has manged to overcome which is not easy as he lacks confidence with communication, socialising and concentration. He was recognised for his hard work and for being a role model by his head teacher. He had a summer job which boosted his confidence. He helps his aunt with caring for his Nan by siting with her whilst she does the shopping. He has a calming nature and is always keen to help others.

MOLLY (Remy) MCSHARRY was nominated by, Dawn Wrench HSS Advisory Teacher, for their excellent GCSE results enabling them to go on to study A levels and for their willingness to be a mentor to new students at school. Molly is applauded for their focus, hard work, kindness to others and enthusiasm throughout their GCSE years. Molly is a role model to younger HSS students.

FRANCESCA MURPHY was nominated by Samadhi-Rose Christopher, HSS Advisory Teacher, for being positive with a fabulous attitude to life and learning. As well as her hearing loss she is severely sight impaired and has a diagnosis of Osteopetrosis, a rear bone disease, and other medical illnesses and has experienced prolonged periods of illness and time in hospital. She perseveres and always tries her best and never gives up. She gives her all and rises to every challenge asked of her. She sat on an interview panel for the Hearing Support Service and has been nominated for Deputy Head girl. She never complains.

JENNIFER-MARIE ROE was nominated by Jemma O'Rourke, HSS Advisory Teacher, for being a superb role model and a wonderful young person. She has worked hard and is now in sixth form doing an EPQ on young children with first language BSL and the impact it has on their lives. She has a part time job and has a two year plan to raise money for her to travel to Borneo with a charity organisation to work with orangutans and help build a community building. She has already raised 2K and is running a marathon to raise funds.

SIENNA WATSON was nominated by Dawn Wrench, HSS Advisory Teacher, for her resilience, maturity and her personal growth and self-confidence over the last 4 years. Earlier this year she underwent explant, re-implant CI surgery. Significant preparation went into pre and post operation and Sienna displayed an inner confidence, pragmatism and composure. She maintained her school work and wanted to return to full school timetable as soon as possible, reflecting her commitment to her studies and school life. She is an excellent role model, achieved excellent results in her studies and is polite and focused.

JUNIOR NOMINEES

EBONY BARNES was nominated by Jemma O'Rourke, HSS Advisory Teacher, for her amazing social skills making a new deaf friend and expressing herself through art. She met with another deaf child visiting her school and she was welcoming and excited and took her hand to guide her round the school

FELIX BOWYER was nominated by Melissa May, HSS Advisory Teacher. When he moved to Dorset at the age of 3 he was waiting to be implanted and he had no meaningful language to communicate. He was amazing at BSL and was quickly using signs at home and school. He can now sign full conversations. He has also used his processors to develop his oral communication. How well he has developed both continues to astound his teacher. He is the only deaf signing child in his school and although this is isolating it has not deterred him and when he was without his Communication Support Worker for 4 months it did not stop him being fully involved with school

JACOB CALVERELY was nominated by his father, Mike Calverley. He auditioned for the lead role in his school play. It involved learning over 100 lines and committing to a busy rehearsal schedule for many months. He impressed his teachers with his loud clear voice and was given the role over very confident hearing peers. He was a superstar.

<u>DARCEY GOOCH</u> was nominated by her mother, Leanne Gooch for the way she has taken to wearing her hearing aid so well. She has shown resilience and responsibility and coped with school and the challenges it has brought socially. She was brave with her MRI and CT scan. She is a star.

ALEX GRAY was nominated by Dawn Wrench, HSS Advisory Teacher, for how he has blossomed into a mature, confident, articulate young man. He is applauded for his enthusiasm in all aspects of school life. When he was absent from school due to ear operations he was positive and articulate describing the procedures to teachers. He was brilliant explaining to teachers at an INSET about his equipment. He is a positive role model and was kind and supported a new hearing aid wearer in his year group last year.

BUDDY HOLIAN was nominated by Sarah Joiner, HSS Advisory Teacher, for his amazing first year at school despite many challenges. He started school when he had only had his implants for a very short time. He was reluctant to wear them at first but soon built the confidence to wear them during the whole day at school. He has learnt some basic BSL and his now able to use them to communicate. He has achieved so much in a short time.

CHARLOTTE HUDSON was nominated by Jemma O'Rourke, HSS Advisory Teacher, for enjoying interaction with a new deaf peer via sign and shared experiences. She does not find painting easy and during a visit with a deaf peer at her SEN school she painted a self-portrait showing her band with BAHA devices and made an ear model with playdough

TODD JEWER was nominated by Jemma O'Rourke, HSS Advisory Teacher. His Advisory Teacher visited his new senior school to deliver training to the staff. Although he was extremely anxious he stood in front of 30 teachers and explained about his radio aid and where to seat him in classes. His family were super proud of the courage he showed.

ISLA LLOYD was nominated by Sarah Poole, HSS Advisory Teacher, for showing confidence and resilience. Isla stood in front of her class and delivered a lesson on the ear and how we hear. She then took questions about her own hearing loss, gave out a worksheet and helped pupils with anything they needed help with.

AVA-RAE ROSE was nominated by her mother, Hannah Rose, for how she has coped starting a new much bigger school which has been overwhelming for her. As she has got older she has become more self-conscious and anxious. She copes with her challenges and does not let her hearing get in the way. She is a trooper and a star.

BETTY WALKE-MYLES has been nominated by Sarah Turpin a professional MSY Practitioner for how she has grown in confidence and working hard to communicate her needs and wishes. She is an incredible young lady who is determined to enjoy life despite being deafblind. She is curious and willing to explore new experiences even though she is nervous. She is developing her communication skills and is beginning to learn BSL signs.



Hello from Gemma Hardman

Speech and Language Therapy

I returned to the beautiful Dorset coast a few years ago, after spending 15 years living and working in London. I have recently started a new role as the Clinical Lead for Deaf Children and Young People's Speech and Language Therapy in Dorset and BCP. Since moving, I've been busy getting to know as many Deaf children and their families as I can! The main aspect of my role involves supporting parents, nurseries and schools to develop Deaf children's speech, language and communication skills through training, coaching and direct therapy. Of course, that's not all my job entails; I've also been developing some in-house training for the wider Speech and Language Therapy team, attending lots of meetings to consider how we can best develop the service and looking at our website and the resources we have available to families and professionals. If you have any ideas about what you would like to see available, please do let me know!

My career working with Deaf children is largely thanks to a friend from college, who convinced me it would be fun to learn BSL level one together. We started attending our local Deaf club, where we attempted to use our new skills and met some hilarious and interesting friends. After graduating from University I moved to North West London, where I started my career working in mainstreams schools and pre-schools. I already knew at this point that I wanted to work primarily with Deaf children and convinced my manager to let me 'have a go' in the local primary and secondary Deaf Resource Bases. Fast forward a few years and I was given a role as the Clinical Lead for Deafness for the trust, which was a steep learning curve in leadership at a relatively young age!



I moved to work for the Great Ormond Street Hospital (GOSH) Cochlear Implant Programme and shortly after was awarded a grant from the National Institute for Health Research (NIHR) to complete a Masters in Clinical Research, which involved running a few research projects at GOSH. By the end of the degree, I had completed three separate projects and supervised some SALT student projects, which I then published in journals. I was also given the opportunity to work as a supporting author for the Deafness guidelines written by Royal College of Speech and Language Therapy (you can find these on their website). This was a fantastic opportunity to meet so many of the leading clinicians from across the country and learn about how things were run in other places.


You might have realised by now that I quite like a challenge... so I then thought, what better thing to do than take up a third job! In the final term of my University degree, whilst also working at GOSH, I took up a role as a lecturer and module co-ordinator on the Speech and Language Therapy masters course at University College London (UCL). I loved working at UCL and teaching the next generation of SALT's about working with Deaf children amongst other things. This is partly why I am now so passionate about not only developing the skills of experienced therapists we have on the Dorset team but also encouraging students and others to join the profession.

Of course, not everything is about work, and our move to Dorset was largely driven by family life. At home I have a husband, two little boys, a dog and a cat... the whole bundle! There's lots to juggle (as I'm sure you all know) but I wouldn't have things any other way.
